ABOUT THE WORKSHOP

Every veteran has memories of his or her military service from enlistment, boot camp, and trainings, through deployments and homecomings. At the UC Student Veterans Summer Writing Workshop, student veterans from across the University of California gather for one week to practice the art of storytelling.

The workshop is held annually at the UC Santa Barbara. In the workshop, student veterans will have the opportunity to compose narratives about their military experiences, guided by instructors who have worked extensively with veterans. Each day, participants take part in a small group workshop, have time to write and revise their stories, and enjoy communal meals, recreation, and evening activities with the other veterans. The schedule also includes an evening barbeque on the beach and a final reading and reception with university and community supporters.

The workshop takes place each June. Participants attend free of charge and are provided meals, lodging, and a travel allowance. If you are a UC student veteran interested in exploring what your service has meant to you, developing your writing skills, and strengthening your ability to communicate with others about your military experiences, we invite you to apply to the UC Student Veterans Summer Writing Workshop.
