Critical Race Theory (CRT) seeks to understand why inequality persists in a society that has explicitly condemned racism and has repeatedly adopted laws and policies intended to eliminate it. CRT demonstrates how laws and policies can reproduce racial inequality—even when they are adopted without explicit racial bias—and is thus an important tool to support our nation's ongoing efforts to achieve a robust multiracial democracy.

Over the past year, CRT has been a source of discussion everywhere—in the media, in school board meetings, in classrooms—and has generated many questions. In this talk, Alexander will discuss CRT's founding and contributions and the recent assault on the theory. *Audience Q&A will follow.*
